Meanwhile, oil continues to gush from the broken pipe. Experts say between 12,000–100,000 barrels a day are spilling into the sea, which is 1,900,000–16,000,000 litres. It is now the worst oil spill in U.S. history. It will result in enormous damage to the Gulf of Mexico's fishing industry, tourism, marine species, wildlife and environment. Hayward's apologies continue in the form of national TV ads. He says: "The Gulf spill is a tragedy that never should have happened...BP has taken full responsibility for cleaning up the spill in the Gulf. We've helped organize the largest environmental response in this country's history....And our cleanup efforts will not come at any cost to taxpayers."
