THE ARTICLE

Myanmar moves its capital city

The military leaders of Myanmar, formerly Burma, are moving the country's capital city 320 kilometers north, to the town of Pyinmana. The government has already transferred nine different departments to the new location and others will soon follow. The new administration center covers a ten-square-kilometer area and will house all government ministries. Spokesman Kyaw Hsan explained the old capital Yangon, formerly Rangoon, was just a "headquarters" after British colonial rule ended in 1948. He said Pyinmana was "the most appropriate place for the seat of a new city".

International rumors are spreading over reasons for the move. Mr. Hsan explained: "The authorities have chosen Pyinmana because it is centrally located and has quick access to all parts of the country." However, some people believe that Myanmar's military dictators fear an American Iraq-style invasion. Pyinmana is more difficult to attack than coastal Yangon. The US has called Myanmar an "outpost of tyranny". Another theory is that the military dictators are afraid of democracy. In 1990, Aung San Suu Kyi won democratic elections but the ruling generals have refused to accept the result.
