THE ARTICLE

Robert Mugabe has won the sham election held across Zimbabwe on June 27. Virtually every country in the region and the world has condemned the election as a fake. Ever since the opposition leader Morgan Tsvangirai pulled out last week, it has been a one-horse race. Tsvangirai beat Mugabe in free and fair elections held last March. Mugabe refused to accept he could lose power and has terrorized his nation into returning him as president. He said he would do anything to stay in power and that only God could remove him. Hundreds of innocent citizens have died at the hands of his ruthless supporters and thousands are homeless. The result is the opposition leader pulling out of the race to prevent more killing, thus handing Mugabe victory.

The situation in Zimbabwe is now totally unacceptable to the international community. The UN Security Council tried to issue a statement to say the election was illegitimate, but South Africa opposed this effort. The UN then made a watered-down statement, saying it regretted the election was not postponed because of the violence. The UN is also pushing for economic sanctions against Zimbabwe and a travel ban on government officials. Nelson Mandela spoke up against Robert Mugabe, saying there was a "tragic failure of leadership in Zimbabwe". UK Prime Minister Gordon Brown said that Zimbabwe had reached a new low point: "We will work with international partners to find a way to close this sickening chapter that has cost so many lives," he said.
