Fighting between the Pakistan military and Taliban rebels has got worse in recent days. Army commanders are increasing their efforts to root out the militants. Pakistan's 'Dawn' newspaper reported heavy fighting in the north-west of the country as the military went on the offensive. Army Major General Athar Abbas said his troops killed at least 55 Taliban fighters in recent attacks. More than 15,000 Pakistan troops have moved into the Swat Valley to take on around 5,000 heavily-armed militants. A Taliban spokesman denied the casualty figures. Muslim Khan said his fighters have killed over 37 Pakistani soldiers in fighting since Wednesday. He said Pakistani troops killed just three Taliban soldiers.
