a wall street journal / nbc news poll found 53 per cent of those surveyed blamed republicans for the government shutdown while 31 per cent blamed president obama observers from other countries are having trouble understanding what is going on in us politics the times of india wrote "what is chilling is that us politicians are willing to engage in a game of brinkmanship that is tantamount to detonating a nuclear device over their economy" a uae businessman commented that "there is something fundamentally wrong with a system that leaves a country without direction in stagnation without a budget and potentially without the wherewithal to settle its debts"
