The "Better Together" campaigners, including the U.K. Prime Minister David Cameron, said Scottish independence would have harmed Scotland. Even though people voted 'no', Scotland will get more powers. Ms Sturgeon said she would work with "anyone in any way" to secure more powers for her country.
